

1932 Metuchen High School Football Team The 1932 team didn't have a winning record – in fact they didn't win a single game season (Point Pleasant 0-6, Somerville 6-32, Leonardo 0-14, Scotch Plains 0-54, South Amboy 6-27), but they did have a "very tough tackle" in their Captain, Mike "Pat" Marzella (front, center). The remaining players are not named.

1958 Metuchen High School Football Team

According to the 1958 yearbook, the *Blue Letter*, that year's team "was considered by many as one of the best in Metuchen's history" and a record number of its members received all-state and all-county recognition. An outbreak of the flu was blamed for the team's only two losses at the beginning of its nine-game season, during which the most dramatic victory was against Scotch Plains, 47 to 0 – quite a contrast to the 1932 score! <u>Ye Olde Metuchen Mail Bag</u>

Being a Metuchen resident and a professional philatelist, it is only natural for me to accumulate envelopes and post cards mailed from Metuchen. Fortunately, longtime resident James Moran's modest collection became available a few years ago after it was in limbo in an attorney's safe for about five years after his passing.

One of the more interesting items from the Moran collection was this envelope with an advertisement for Light Brahmas for sale by Metuchen farmer Abm. V.N. (Abram or

Abraham Van Nest) DeForeest. The envelope was sent to Smyrna, New York and has backstamps dated 1884 from both Smyrna (receiving) and New York City (transit), and is franked with two 2-cent stamps to pay the double weight rate.

Thanks to the internet, the Author gathered basic information about both the chickens and the farmer. Light Brahmas are still available today. They are a very old breed of chicken probably originating in India and brought to this country around 1850 by Yankee sailors on their return from trading in Far Eastern ports. They have full feathered shanks and toes, and a striking black and white plumage pattern. Brahmas are exceptionally quiet, gentle, and easy to handle. Their small pea comb, great size, and heavy plumage make them almost immune to cold weather. The hens are good layers of brown eggs, especially in winter, and will also set. Cockerels develop a tremendous frame, grow rather slowly, but when fully fleshed make a beautiful roasting chicken. They are easy to dress with light plumage and yellow skin. Baby chicks are creamy white, but some have shades of gray on the back.

Internet research also revealed that Farmer DeForeest was a direct descendant of one of the first of the Dutch settlers in New Amsterdam (now New York City) arriving in the second quarter of the 17th Century.

His grandfather, of the same name, (1749-1847) served under Washington in the Revolutionary War. Although the internet yielded great information about the other members of the DeForeest family, there was not much about this particular member. A trip to the Metuchen public library failed to enhance the information. No one named DeForeest was listed in the September 2, 1878 school roll included by David Trumbull Marshall in his *Boyhood Days in Old Metuchen*. The 1880 Federal census lists the only Abraham DeForest as a clerk in East New Brunswick. If readers know anything about the location and years of operation of the DeForeest farm, it would be much appreciated. County Grants Update

The Metuchen-Edison Historical Society continues to work on two projects funded in part by grants awarded by the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Commission/Board of Chosen Freeholders, and the New Jersey Historical Commission, a Division of the Department of State. First, this past summer we completed our second year of transcribing our oral history collection. The transcriptions allow more of the public to "listen" to the 1970s interviews of Metuchen area residents.

The value of oral histories is that they provide an insight into the everyday, human aspect of living and working in a community. Local residents will find the stories told both interesting and informative. When the transcriptions are complete, they will be available in both the Metuchen and Edison libraries as well as for sale at a nominal fee.

Our second project is to begin working with a newly donated collection. Sidney and Ruth Frankel have donated to the historical society his collection of mid-twentieth century documents related to politica events in Edison Township. - Nancy Zerbe

Evelyn Hale (1922-2005)

Evelyn Jeanne Weber Hale, 83, a long-time member of the Society, died at JFK Medical Center on April 24, 2005. A native of the Bay Ridge section of Brooklyn, NY, Mrs. Hale moved with her family to Metuchen in 1925 and was residing in what had been her childhood home at the time of her death. Evelyn graduated from Metuchen High School in 1940 and from the Ballard School in New York City a year later. She worked as a secretary from then until the birth of her only child in 1955 after which she became a full-time homemaker. She also belonged to the Reformed Church of Metuchen and the Matochshoning-Rebecca Cornell Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. In later years, family genealogy became her hobby. Society members probably most recall Evelyn for the many years she served as hospitality chair when she came to be called "the refreshment lady" and was best known for serving her "sparkling golden punch" (equal parts chilled white grape juice and ginger ale). She will be sorely missed by all.

From the Caribbean to New Jersey: the Anguillians of Perth Amboy

On Sunday, September 18, 2005, the Society hosted another successful program sponsored by the New Jersey Council on the Humanities. The speaker, Dr. Lawrence Hogan is a Professor of History at Union County College and has presented programs to Society previously, notably on the Shady Rest Country Club and Negro Leagues Baseball. The topic this past Sunday was "African-American History as Immigration History: The Anguillians of Perth Amboy." A number of attendees were of Anguillian descent, and some were even featured in the accompanying slide show of early to midtwentieth century photographs.

Dr. Hogan described the circumstances surrounding African-American immigration from the Caribbean island of Anguilla to Perth Amboy starting at the turn of the century and through the 1930s. Primarily, the Anguillians who came to New Jersey left to find year-round work instead of the seasonal agricultural work primarily available on their home island. And, instead of a mass migration, Dr. Hogan explained that this was more of a "chain migration," starting with only a few people who moved to Perth Amboy. After these



initial immigrants became established and employed, others from the close-knit communities of Anguilla joined them.

Although assimilating in many ways, many of these immigrants remained in cohesive communities once here, as evidenced in various church congregations and in the Caribbean festivals still held in Perth Amboy today. -Tyreen Reuter

He took more than 2,800 photographs of the Metuchen-Edison area, mostly during the 1930s, which make up 80 percent of the Historical Society's photographic collection. The Metuchen-Edison Historical Society dedicates this publication to Lloyd Grimstead, as a way of honoring him for collecting and recording so much of our local history.
